During the year, we learned of the benefits of chocolate, held an annual business meeting, supported programming at OneEighty with a shower of sheets and towels collected at our Holiday luncheon, learned about domestic violence service in our community, and expanded our understanding of the Muslim religion. More than forty members and guests gathered in April for our annual Spring Luncheon at The Wooster Country Club where we had a chance to learn "Thirty Things You Did Not Know"

Along the way the Literary Group read and discussed ten books; the Branch supported a StartSmart workshop at The College of Wooster and also helped with the "Expanding Your Horizons" science education program for local middle school students. And then there were several outings with the "Dinner and a Movie" group and with the "Out-and-About" contingent. Our AAUW efforts were recognized recently at the Ohio AAUW convention which I attended in Columbus on behalf of our branch. At the meeting our local Branch received several awards—in fact we were recognized in every one of the award categories that were noted with the exception of an award for expanding membership. Our membership held constant last year, but did not increase.

The certificates which we received for our work are posted on the Wooster Branch website (www.wooster-oh.aauw.net). They include: a Starz Award in recognition of our participation in activities promoting AAUW, a recognition for Outstanding Giving to the Educational Opportunities Fund, the Daffodil Diversity Award for our efforts in recognizing and promoting diversity, an award for Excellence in Mission-Based Programming among medium-size branches (our support of the StartSmart program), and a third place award for the quality of our overall communications materials among branches with more than 50 members (our newsletter and our website).

Before the year ends, we will once again have the opportunity to support a new crop of scholarship winners, as recommended by our Scholarship Committee consisting of Susie Slack, Judy Mallonn, and Letty Nault. At our recent Board meeting, \$5,000 was budgeted for these scholarships.

A summary of the year would not be complete without thanking and congratulating our new officers for 2017-2018 who were elected at the Spring Luncheon. They include Anita Greene, membership and communications vice president, and Sarah Miles, Treasurer.

A more detailed list of our accomplishments for the year was included in the program for the Spring Luncheon and is included later in this newsletter.

As the year winds down, it is time to start thinking about next year. We will have some challenges. The future of the annual AAUW-Kiwanis Used Book Sale is unclear, we will need to find a new location for our Spring Luncheon, our membership appears to be declining, and several of our members have asked to be relieved of various duties, resulting in a need to find replacements. BUT, I believe we are up to these challenges and more!

If you have not already done so, please return your membership renewal form as soon as possible. I look forward to continuing to work with you all in the coming AAUW year.

AAUW/KIWANIS USED BOOK SALE UPDATE

While things are well under way for this year's book sale in September, the future of the sale remains unclear. While we are making progress in terms of maintaining our current space for the ongoing cleaning and sorting of books, it turns out that we simply may not have the manpower (or women power) to continue this fundraiser. As a result of these concerns, several members met with representatives of Kiwanis recently to discuss the sale. Kiwanis, like us, is struggling with adequate staffing. At the same time, the book sale chairs from both groups have expressed an interest in beginning to disengage after many years of leading the sale and are looking for someone to step up and work with them to take over these duties. So far, neither group has located persons interested in taking this on.

In order to get a better idea of member interest, a member of Kiwanis developed a survey for members of both groups about the future of the sale. To date, about half of the AAUW members have responded. Results indicate that while there are a fair number of people willing to work on the project, about 40% of those who responded to a particular question about the future of the sale noted that they believed the project may have run its course. Specifically, 40% of the respondents indicated that they could not help with the sale, 65% indicated that they would not be able to move books to the sale site, and 74% said that they could not tear down or deliver books to Goodwill after the sale. On the other hand, 21 members said they would be willing to continue to clean and sort books, and 32 were willing to help at least one day at the actual sale. Once we know the results from Kiwanis we will meet again and take a hard look at future directions. News from Vice President Anita Greene and Sarah is that with membership renewals and a new member our total enrollment is currently at 42.
