Yes, it's that time of year again—the opportunity to make our major fundraiser a tremendous success! It will be

September 25 through 28 at the Wayne County Fairgrounds.
Please volunteer as often as you are able.

The Kiwanis Book Committee under the leadership of Walt Kearney, Don Ackerman, and Ed McKiernan has made tremendous strides in organizing and planning for the 2019 sale. The revised marketing message – **Wooster Used Book Sale** – a joint event by the Kiwanis and American Association of University Women, benefits Wooster youth and provides scholarships for women.

A few facts rounded up by Ed McKiernan:

- Largest fall used book sale in Ohio
- Over 47,000 items on sale
- Books are cleaned, sorted, and categorized
- 95% of books are donated
- 75% of the books are hardcover
- Book Sale is now accepting major credit cards
