MESSAGE FROM WOOSTER BRANCH AAUW PRESIDENT

A heartfelt thank you to everyone who worked on the book sale! Especially Ed McKiernan and the Kiwanis book committee for organizing and advertising, Don Ackerman and Walt Kearney for their days at the event, and Sarah Miles for acting as treasurer of the sale.

On Saturday, September 28, Kris Evans and I attended the AAUW Fall Summit in Worthington. The keynote speaker was Kendra Davis, AAUW VP Advancement and Partnerships. She highlighted the need for local branches to align their work with the AAUW strategic plan and other initiatives that foster the

organization's mission of advancing gender equity for women and girls. One of her suggestions was to partner with a local organization to facilitate an online WorkSmart event. She also related that the Legal Action and Educational Funds are very well endowed and thus encouraged local branches to instead contribute to the Greatest Needs Fund in order to meet emergent issues. Lastly, she encouraged branches to openly advertise programs and engage the community through social media.
