AAUW USED BOOK SALE

Preparations for the possibility of holding the AAUW/Kiwanis book sale are under way. Using very strict CDC guidelines, volunteers are working again at the warehouse preparing books for the sale. The first drop-off held on July 11 had 41 drop-offs (one person had 20 boxes of books!) and on July 18 there were 27 drop-offs. Volunteers have begun cleaning, pricing and sorting on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings in small groups. Drop-offs are on Saturday mornings, 10 a.m. - 12 noon, as in the past.

Kiwanis is considering the option and will be meeting soon to make their decision. Members will be notified as soon as a decision is made.
