#### **REMEMBERING JUDY BONK**

The branch will miss longtime member Judy Bonk who passed away on October 19. She will be remembered by many members for the decades she devoted to the book sale; in one member's words, she WAS the book sale. Many fondly remember collecting books with her and storing them in her home. Our current book sale owes much to her years of devotion to it.

It has been suggested that, because of her dedication to scholarships for women, contributions in her memory may be made to the AAUW Scholarship Fund at the Wayne County Community Foundation.

#### PROGRAMS

Our program of events got off to a great start on October 14 with a presentation about **Inclusive Citizenship in the U.S.**, given by Jane Hoyt-Oliver, PhD, Emerita Professor of the Social Work program at Malone University. Dr. Oliver taught social welfare policy for over 25 years as a member of the faculty at Malone. She challenged us, when voting for elected officials, to consider not only our personal needs but more importantly the needs of the greater society in which we live. What might it mean to ask our elected representatives to address issues that may matter less to us but are <u>critical</u> to the lives of others? She cautioned us to remember that we do NOT know all there is to know about the lives of others and that we can become more effective advocates by learning about the lived experiences of others. She encouraged us to find ways in which each of us can be an advocate for those in our community who do not have a "seat at the table" where decisions are made, decisions which significantly affect the lives of those in our community who have limited financial resources, limited power.

People in powerful positions can **choose** to represent the concerns of those who have less power. Thus, we, as caring members of our community, should speak to those in power to assure that the true concerns and needs of those who may not be able to advocate for themselves receive the necessary consideration.
