Hidden Treasures

You never know what you'll find in a used book. Annotations, authors' signatures, bookmarks, grocery slips, and the owner's name, address, and date of purchase—all are relatively common and can be pleasure-filled windows into fragments of our shared histories. But at times, something more unusual appears. And as Wooster AAUW board members can attest, that "something" can turn readers into amateur sleuths.



While recently looking through donated books for the AAUW book sale, Anne Strauss unexpectedly discovered four black and white photographs. One was a formal portrait of an adult woman. The other three captured the cherubic nature of several young children, with one photo featuring two who could be twins. The three were clearly early twentieth-century photographs, the other probably from the seventies or eighties. But who were they of? Who had owned them? Strauss couldn't find any identifying information.

She was hesitant to throw them away, perhaps thinking of the time she had found a note from a "soon to be family member" praising the book owner for being welcoming and "raising a wonderful son." Recognizing the family name, she had returned the note and received a "thank you" and a hug in return. But since these photos remained enigmas, she contacted Pat Mathews, suggesting putting them in the newsletter to see if an AAUW member might recognize them.

Pat, however, was reluctant to publish without first identifying their owner. So she took the photos to an AAUW board meeting to share with the group.

Barb Friedhoff thought they might be pictures from books a team had gathered from an older home in the downtown area. Then Sarah Miles, noting that the woman looked familiar, volunteered two names. A quick online search for a match at first drew a blank. But the second was a hit—Doris Stammer, who in her eighties had recently moved from her family home on E. Wayne Avenue.



Kris Evans volunteered to return the photos to Doris Stammer at an upcoming luncheon, but when she didn't attend, Kris went the extra mile, meeting her in Stammer's new home to return the photos and gather more information about them. In what Kris called "a delightful visit," Doris speculated that the portrait was most likely taken when she received a promotion at the bank where she had been employed, then People's National and eventually FirstMerit, from which she retired. Beginning as a mail clerk right out of Millersburg High School (now West Holmes), she remained at FirstMerit for 41 years, rising through the ranks to become senior vice president and corporate secretary.

She also told Kris that one of the children in the photos was her late husband, Harold L. Stammer, a native of New York.



Doris has given generously to Wayne County through her volunteer work with Quota International of Wooster, the Women's Committee for the Wooster Symphony, the Wayne County Republican Party, and the Muskingum Valley Presbytery.

In 2014, her volunteer service was showcased when she received the biennial Women of Achievement award from the Wooster Community Hospital Auxiliary. In 2016, Wooster's Quota club honored her as their first 50-year member, and in 2019, the Wayne County Republican Party presented her with their Chairman Award.



So, the mystery of the photos had been solved, but only partially. We still don't know which child is Harold L. Stammer. Could he be one of the "twins"? Were these two truly twins? Who are the two little boys in sailor suits? Who is the older child? Can the date of Stammer's formal photo be determined by dress, hair style, and jewelry? Fortunately, Kris had the foresight to scan the photos before she returned them to Doris so we can continue sleuthing, if we so wish. And who knows, as Anne Strauss jokingly said, an allusive \$20 or \$50 bill may turn up in another book along the way.

Do you have a bit of Miss Marple in you?

Introducing Your 2024-2025 Scholarship Recipients

Asharia Irby is enrolled in the Licensed Practical Nurse program at the Wayne County Career Center and currently works as a certified nursing assistant at Danbury in Wooster. Her aspiration is to be a hospice or psychiatric nurse. She has a passion for helping people in less fortunate situations access appropriate health care. Those with mental setbacks call to her heart, and she hopes to be their supplemental family when others cannot. She says that finishing her program is the most important thing to her for her future.

Asharia is a first-generation college student and the only person of color in her class. In addition to nursing skills, she hopes to learn more about providing health services to those from different back grounds. Asharia indicated that this scholarship will help remove the financial obstacles in her path.

Joanna Swartzentruber, a second time recipient of an AAUW scholarship, will be finishing her final semester this fall at the University of Akron. After earning her undergraduate degree in psychology, she plans to enroll in a graduate program next fall, eventually earning a doctorate in counseling. She loves working for non-profits and wants to bring mental health care to those who cannot afford it.

Joanna is particularly aware of the lack of diverse options when one is seeking mental health care in Wayne County. She believes that everyone deserves to be able to find a mental health provider who makes them feel comfortable. She wants to be one of their options.

Joanna works as an administrator at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Wayne County and also volunteers as guardian ad litem for the Wayne County District Attorney's office.

Amanda Myers is pursuing a bachelor of science in nursing degree at the University of Akron, Wayne College. She has worked for 10 years as a nursing assistant, most recently at West View Healthy Living in Wooster. Her nursing assistant career has included being a mentor to other State Tested Nurse Aids. She is currently a full-time college student and a single parent to a six-year-old boy.

Amanda wants to work as an emergency room nurse or a traveling nurse. The BSN will give her many options. She particularly enjoys being a student with some life experiences behind her because she is able to help and share with the younger students useful advice or information. This scholarship will help her achieve her dream by providing her family some financial security as she continues her journey. The AAUW/Kiwanis Used Book Sale supports various projects throughout our community.

AAUW uses the proceeds it receives to fund college scholarships for adult women who have had their education interrupted by life circumstances.

At the June meeting, the AAUW board approved our plan to place these items in the Special Collections of The College of Wooster Library.




