We are thrilled that they have agreed to fund our request of \$15,763.00. We will be scheduling the work with Bogner Construction soon. We are so fortunate to have an entity like the

Community Foundation in our city. Now we can continue to focus on our mission of providing scholarships to women in Wayne County without using some of the proceeds of the sale to fund the doors. We will also be able to continue providing great books at affordable prices to residents of Wayne County and the surrounding areas. Continue to spread the word that books may be donated every Saturday morning between 10 and 12.

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
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
Literary

We've read a wide variety of books this past year, beginning with learning about the relationship between a worker in an aquarium and a curmudgeonly giant Pacific octopus in **Remarkably Bright Creatures**. Other creatures, the golden beetles of New Caledonia, provided the reason for reading **Miss Benson's Beetles**.

We ended 2023 by reading **Reviving Ophelia:** saving the selves of adolescent girls. An alternative tack was taken for discussion of this book. The different time periods that adolescent girls experienced were shared. Questions that had been submitted by members were shared and discussed with a Senior Attending Physician






The January and February meetings were both conducted via Zoom. Clark and Division and The Alice Network both deal with women in different war eras. Clark and Division takes place in 1944, when 24-year-old Aki Ito and her parents are forced to move from California to Chicago with other Japanese-American detainees. Aki is determined to find out the circumstances surrounding her sister's death, who moved to Chicago shortly before the arrival of Aki and her family. The Alice Network is set in two story lines. A female spy is recruited to the real-life Alice Network in France during World I, and an unconventional American socialite searching for her cousin in 1947 are

brought together in a mesmerizing story of courage and redemption.

From Chicken to Eagle: Seven Women Paddling Whitewater and Navigating Life is a collection of short memoirs of women who took a wilderness adventure in 1979 when women were testing their mettle in society and in the wilderness. They accomplished things that were beyond their imaginations and comfort levels, allowing them to find meaning, purpose, challenge and enjoyment in their personal and professional lives.



Book selection for 2024-25 will take place at our next meeting on **May 21 at 6:00pm at the First Presbyterian Church.** We will be voting on books for 2024-2025 following our annual dinner.



The June meeting will be on June 21, 7:00, at the home of Mimi Lewellen. Don Ackerman will lead the discussion of **Trust**, by Herman Diaz.

Late afternoon we finished on Wall Street and were in the back row (but there!) for closing bell.

In principle and practice, AAUW values and seeks an inclusive membership, workforce,

leadership team, and board of directors. There shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of age, disability, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, geographical location, national origin, race, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, and socioeconomic status.

Scholarship Committee

As you probably remember, in the fall we revised the eligibility criteria for our scholarships. Previously, our scholarships were only available to students pursuing an associate or a bachelor degree. We expanded the eligibility to include consideration of graduate degrees or specialized certification/licensure needed for employment. Priority, however, continues to be those applicants who are enrolled in associate or bachelor degree programs.

This year we also changed our application deadline to March 15 in order to comply with the plans the Foundation had to streamline the application process and expand our pool of applicants. Although we were hesitant at first, it appears that the results were beneficial.

This year we had 16 applicants who met the expanded criteria for consideration. Of those there were six equally outstanding applicants and we made award recommendations based on financial need. The Board will be reviewing our recommendations at the next meeting.

Thank you to Susan Roberts for helping evaluate the applicants this year. Thank you to Barb Friedhoff for serving an extra year and our co-chair this year. Sue Herman will be our chairperson next year.

Report from the Treasurer

For those of you not able to attend our Spring Luncheon/Annual Meeting here are the two big items in the Treasurer's realm that have happened

We opened up three CDs in February 2024 at Commercial & Savings Bank. We started in \$5000 in each and have staggered maturity dates as follows:

- 7 months earning 4.94%
- 11 months earning 4.84%
- 25 months earning 4.31%

To date we have made \$174.39 in interest across all three.

We are also exploring adding online payments as an option. We would be using the same company that we rent our credit card machines from. The downside to online credit card payments is that there is a transaction fee charged by the credit card companies and a nominal fee for the program each month.
